they didn't use the same name, they changed names. But I don't know of any case where a man has the same name, so that in this case I believe that it is simply a (13 3/4)

of which you'll find a good many.

Now the next, 3, Asa. Kings doesn't tell us a great deal about Asa. Chronicles tells quite a bit more. In this case, no difference in the general picture given, except that in one point it reverses. Kings represents him as a good king. Chronicles also represents him as a good king but it represents him as in searching insincerely, not doing right. In certain instances trusting to his own desires and plans and being rebuked by the prophet for it. That is not told in Kings.
