Well, there is a similarity, but actually when you get into the heart of it the two stories are utterly different. The whole viewpoint and purpose is different; the whole picture of Adam and of Adapa are utterly different and—Adam ate; Adapa refused to eat. Adam ate in disobedience; Adapa refused to eat in obedience. Adapa, as he says, the guess is, and it is a good guess too, that ^{Adapa} misled him. He didn't want to become immortal. On the other hand, how do we know?
