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...we have just read the sixth chapter of the book of Isaiah. When I was in Seminary, one of our professors gave a sermon on a subject in Seminary Chapel, which he entitled, "Three Sights Worth Seeing." And this chapter was his text. Personally, I believe that a much better title can be given to the chapter than the one he chose. I think that (1)

(1 1/4) The chapter begins with the words "In the year that King Uzziah died." It is always good to put a date on something. I was looking over some notes on chapel talks in past years, and some of them have no date, and I wonder, were these last year and some of you have heard them, five years ago, and none of you have heard them. It's always good to put a date on anything, you can't tell but what it may be helpful later.

But in this particular case I don't think it is merely a date (1 3/4)

in the year that King Uzziah died is to remind

us of the situation in which God gave him this vision. (2)

and in this chapter he says in the year that King Uzziah died, not merely as telling when it happened as it is (2 1/4)

(2 1/2) and then Uzziah became overconfident of his own <sup>personality</sup> goodness, and of his own <sup>ability</sup> wisdom, and of his own power, and forgets the fact that everything he has is from God, and God has given him a certain <sup>task</sup> ~~character~~ and that was his <sup>task</sup> ~~path~~ to do, not to try to direct other things which God had not put him over.
