a discussion of thought of was the desirable thing. And so, I think/God's plan, how God gave Isaiah a glimpse of His plan, and its difference from what any one of us would have imagined. But it is what the Scripture gives, and the importance then of a careful study of to see what is the Scriptures,/God's plan, and how we fit into it.

It seems to me you can draw together under that a great many of the different themes that are vital in order to have a person have a well-rounded view of the world situation and how we should fit into it to serve the Lord. And then to have a coordinated program and take one of these themes and deal with it for, say a week, and during that time to start in with, I think best that I give a talk first - and not a long talk, 45 minutes trying to look into all aspects of it , but talk of 20 minutes with one Scripture passage and the main emphasis of the theme driven home. Just two or three main aspects. Then I think the next day we could divide the class up, divide the student body up among all the instructors, so that each one would have a group, and have him speak say, for half an hour on the theme. And then maybe the next day, have the group meet with the instructor and have each one speak from 3 to 5 minutes on it, and bring in the ideas that have come to them them, or its relation to their own lives. And to have a check made, a report made, on how well it they do, on what problems and impressions they get and their situation in relation to the theme. Then to have these questions brought to me and I get together with the instructors and we discuss the situation, and then I give a final talk on what amounts to more or less summarizing.

Well, no. I, that is a matter to be thought through, as to whether it should be a definite one-week thing, or whether you take a theme and deal with it in its variations. It seems to me it is best not to be too
