Perhaps I should example explain about what I said not a typing or publishing anything from a tape that I make. My observation is that spoken language and written language are quite different. When I write trying anything, I would like to read the sentences over and try to put the motor emphases on wrong places, seeing if you won't get an entirely different meaning than what I meant. Because you cannot tell a person who is reading something that you write where where to put the emphasis; If you place that writing and speaking are very different. When you speak there is

that writing and speaking are very different. When you speak there is accent memphasis, there is gesture, and there are so many things that contribute that you have to get them in some other way in writing. Another thing is that in speaking when one makes often a/slip of the tongue , if you get things a little twisted, you say John when you meant Paul. It is perfectly obvious to somebody who is listening because of what you saysaid a sentence before or a sentence after. But anything that is published conf somebody can grank grab hold a sentence or two. I have seen how modernists are ready to grab on anything that a Bible believers says, and show him to be an utter xgrammx ignoramous. So anything that is published or printed with my name on, I like to have a chance to look it over very, very carefully, and be sure that it is a written language rather a spoken language before that is done.
