MARTIN LUTHER

I find myself in quite a difficulty this aft ernoon. To discuss the subject of Martin Luther in a few minutes is extremely difficult because it is a large subject with many facets and many aspects to it. And I find it particularly difficult this afternoon because I feel I must preface it with a passage of Scripture and it is rather hard to deal with this passage without taking a bit of time, but I'll try to go as fast as I can. The passage to which I would like to call your attention is Matthew 16, verses 13 to 23:

v.13When Jesus came into the coasts of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, saying, Whom do men say that I the Son of man am?

v.14 And they said, Some say that thou art John the Baptist:
some, Elias; and tohers, Jeremias, or one of the prophets.
v.15 He saith unto them, but whom say ye that I am?
v.16 And Simon Peter answered and said unto him, Thousart the Christ, the Som of the living God.

v.17 And Jesus answered and said unto him, Blessed are thou, Simon Barjona: for flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my Father which is in heaven.

v. 18 And I say also unto thee, That thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.

v. 19 And I will give unto thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven: and whatsoever thou shalt bind on earth shall be bound in heaven: and whatsoever thou shalt loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven.
