Clark H. Pinnock refers to <u>Studies of Evangelicalism</u> by Marsden, Ramm, Bloesch, Quebedeaux and desires in addition to mention Donald W. Dayton, <u>Discovering an Evangelical Heritag</u>e (New York: Harper & Row, 1976). Of this latter book he says: "It offers some new insights that are needed at this time."

Pinnock speaks of men of "bona fide opponents of Biblical Authority, such as Barr, Nineham or Evans."

He suggests a sharp distinction between E. J. Young <u>Thy Word is Truth</u> and his own book <u>Biblical Revelation</u> (Moody, 1971).

In the middle of his article he quotes Calvin as referring to "the writer's unconcern for such details" as numerical minutia(on 1 Cor. 10:8). He refers to Calvin's remarks on Mat. 22:2. He critisizes "the pedantic concern for trivia."

He declares a contrast between Schaeffer, No Final Conflict, pp. 33ff. and J. I. Packer, <u>Fundamentalism</u> and the Word of God, p. 99.

He says, "Instead of patiently working through Paul's thought and striving to understand the male 'headship' in relation to Jesus and Paul's attitude to authority and servanthood, so that the teaching of the <u>whole</u> Bible is affirmed and vindicated, some of the evangelical feminists sweep the whole idea of headship and submission aside as culturally relative, and take shortcut to egalitarian feminism, slicing right across the principle of biblical infallibility."
