## Chp. "Wod's Word" .....

We might perhaps judiciously conclude this chapter by calling attention to certain frequent illogicalities on the part of others than the orthodox in approaching the problem of the Bible and Sacred Scriptures. Indeed, the orthodox are by all odds the most logical of religionists in their attitude toward, and utilization of Holy Writ. There are a certain group of Modernists who completely reject the Biblical God and yet retain reverent respect for God's Word. Another group reject any such conception as that of the divine inspiration and sanctity of the Bible but cling to the conception of God which we owe to the Bible. It ought to be apparent to any logically-minded individual that God andGod's word are an indivisible couplet which cannot well be separated, though of course we recognize that it is possible to believe in a God who is in no sense related to the anthropomorphic God of the Bible. What we are maintaining is that it is illogical to reject the God of the Bible and retain the conventional attitude toward the Bible, and equally indefensible to accept the God of the Bible and reject His word as
