trivial point of the narzative.

Fact The very fact that it should be thought worth while to give the great amount of time to this project shows how important it is considered to be. This is would be utterly absurd if it was not basically certain what the text to the Bible is and only a question of incidental accuracy and particular details.

The statement toward in the early part of the article, that #M#M# even the Lord's Prayer is questionable is p not born out by what is said later on. It is merely a question of whether the original Lord's Prayer had the final words of praise, "For thine is the glory, and the kingdom, the kingdom, and the power and the glory forever". Actually these words are not part of a prayer, but a conclusion to it. They are not found in Luke's Gospel at all. Whether they are tune or false makes very little difference for as the author has pointed out, the thought of them is contained in I Chronicles and in many other places in the Scripture.

It is a fine thing to bring to the attention of the people this great project to gain even greater certainty as to the exact text of the Scripture than we have now. The impression which it gives that the Bible is something whose texts is very uncertain and that popular ideas of it are entirely false is utterly contrary to the true facts. In the interest of truth it is greatly to be hoped that you will print this statement of the true situation. It would be even better if you would publish an article which would to some extent offset the unfortunate misimpression that has been given by what you have published.
