Z1.52 30 this generation shall not pass away, until all these things be cf. \Mat. 24.34 (genea may have been purposely employed because it is capable of being under-LK. 17.22-23 Although the disciples are addressed as the ones who would desire His coming 10-5, LK. 12.45 they would not see it and are warned not to be led astray by false rumors 24,26 The days of the Son of man may be thought to be in contrast with the days that will come (v.22) in which ye shall desire to see one of the days of the Son of man and shall not see it. This parable was "added" because "they supposed that the kingdom of God was immediately to appear"(11). He said therefore, A certain mobleman went into a far country, to receive for himself a kingdom, and to return. His servents were told to "occupy" till he came Christ spoke of certain things that must needs come to pass first; but "the John 16.2 end is not immediately!

(2 Pet. 1.15 ye may be able after my decease to call these things to remembrance) (v.14 The Lord shewed Peter he must "put off this tabernacle") be not quickly shaken from your mind, nor yet be troubled . . . as that 2 Thess. 2.2 the day of the Lord is just at hand 3.11f For we hear of some that walk among you disorderly, that work not at all but are busybodies. Now them that are such we command . . that with quietness they work, and eat their own bread.

> 2 Pet.1.14 the putting off of my tabernacle cometh swiftly (i.e. suddenly, without warning) even as our Lord Jesus Christ hath shewed me cf. Jn. 21.19 where John declares Christ had shown Pet. "by what death he should glorify God" Pet. believed his death would be a sudden, violent one but this did not keep him from exhorting his readers to look for and earnestly desire the coming of the day of God(3.12)
