terrible anvil chorus of people who are critising and slamming all the time and you should not join the anvil chorus, but you should show love. Of course that was brought in in the course of his talk, but when he got back to Westminster he told them that MacRae and this fellow whose name I forget had a debate, but of course he had the last say, I had the first one, but I had the longer say.

But he gave a very vivid and forceful interesting talk on this parable. He read it first how the different men were hired at different times of the day and then at the end of the day they each were given the same pay, etc. Then he said from this parable we learn what are the rewards of Christian service.

He said the first reward of Christian service is the pay. These men got the penny. That's the pay. So the Christian minister is worthy of his hire. He is going into a profession and he is entitled to his pay and so on. That's the first reward of Christian service. But he said there will be many times when there won't be much reward. There will be times when the rewards seem few and far between, and you don't seem to get anything from it, but he said the perable shows that there are other important rewards.

He said the second important reward is the joy of the servant. Here were these men working in the field and in the they say we have borne the heat of the day. They just worked through all the difficulties because of the joy of service, and how you when you go into Christian work you have the joy of service. He explated on that a while.

Then, he said, however, there will be times when there won't be much material reward and times when things will seem to go wrong and there won't be much joy in service. And Fortunately the parable shows us a

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
