In 1902, a theory was put forward and rapidly gained ground to the effect that <u>Piers Plowman</u> was the work of a plurality of authors; see <u>Camb. Hist. Eng. Lit., vol. ii, p. 3 sqq. Today, as my colleague A. Blyth Webster informed me, scarcely a philologist of any eminence takes it seriously. In the case of Homer, the paradox has had a longer run.</u>

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See A. Jepson, Essays on Old Testament Hermeneutics ed. by C. Westermann pp. 246-47. Wellhausen in 1882 resigned from the theological faculty at Greifswald and transferred to the faculty of Semetic languages at Halle because, as he himself said, he feared that his approach to the Old Testament was, in spite of all reserve on his part, unfitting his students for the ministry.

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
