New Helps For Learning Hebrew. Introductory Hebrew Grammar, by R. Laird Harris, Ph.D. (Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co., Grand Rapids, Mich., 1951, \$2.50) and Grammar of the Hebrev Language, by G. Douglas Young, Ph.D. (Zondervan Publishing House, Grand Rapids, Mich., 1951, \$4.00) Until recently it was difficult to find a good beginner's book for the study of the original language of most of the Old Testament. The lover of the Bible, therefore, rejoices at the appearance of two excellent helps in this field. While the books differ considerably in their method and approach, either one will prove extremely useful. If a man is naturally gifted in languages, Professor Young's book will perhips give him the quickest entrance into Hebrew. The average student will find Dr. Harris's especially helpful, for it is so clearly written and has such a fine pedagogical method that even the person with little or no language ability should be able, with its help, to get a sound grasp of the fundamentals of Hebrev and eventually to become a good student of the Old Testament in the original languages. Both books deserve high recommendation.
