Dr. M. -- Only partly. There is something else about America, that is even more of a miracle than this. It is the way that God has fulfilled the prayer of its founders that the land should be a land of liberty, and a haven for the oppressed.

Our forefathers came here from a world that was torn by strife and hatred, and absurdly ranked in classes according to birth. In America everyone has the right to show what abilities he has, and to be rated by his accomplishments rather than his birth. We all stand equal before the law. This was unknown in the world from which our fathers came.

At this very day Europe is split into areas which thank of one another as natural enemies. We can stand near a border and talk to the people and find that they are convinced that those on the other side of it are hateful, wicked men who will destroy them if they can. When we cross the border we find exactly the same attitude on the other side. In America, on the contrary, individuals can roam from one end of this country to the ot her, without ever having to show a passport, or to give proof of identity, or to be subject ao any of the interminable regulations and restrictions that are foudd in practically every other part of the world. Some years ago I went with my father to visit an old Frenchman in California. The man could hardly contain himself for expressing his joy at being in America. "Here," he said, "we find Frenchmen and Gemans woritns cogether in complete harmony, and English and Russians living like brothers." The old racial antagonisms and hatreds of Europe have complete y disappeared. The United States is a great melting pot. Dy and large, there is equality of opportunity for our people regardless of race, language, or national origin. God has wrought a miracle, in building a nation with ideals hardly to be paralleled elsewhere. Today, a third of the world is held under the cruelest tyranny and oppression that the world has ever known. Thousands of innocent people have had the experience
