

than one percent of the people, controls the nation. Every few years each member of the party is thoroughly investigated to make sure all his words and actions have been in line with the policies supported by the leaders of the party. If not, he is expelled from the party. In Russia expulsion from the party usually leads to deprivation of freedom and often to death. Belief in God and the Bible is regarded as competitive with loyalty to the state, therefore is suppressed in many ways. Christians cannot get into schools of higher learning and are excluded from all but its most menial jobs. Never has there been a more tyrannical or more thorough-going and pervasive tyranny than that which was instituted in Russia by Lenin and further developed by Stalin. Details of the system are described, though not always in a very well-organized manner, in various parts of Solzhenitsyn's excellent set of volumes called The Gulag Archipelago.

The basic part of the doctrine of Marxist-Leninism is the expectation and determination that communist leadership will eventually control the entire globe. Once complete power is obtained in a nation the primary objective of the leadership becomes the extension of that power to other nations. Its leaders have declared this in the plainest of language. They have said that they will bury all who support other systems of government and they are bending every possible effort toward the accomplishment of this purpose. Children are imbued with it in the primary schools. It is constantly propagandized all through the educational system and the radio constantly drums into the ears of all their people the ideals of communism and the attack on all other systems, which they call 'imperialist', as though communism were not just that, to a much higher degree.
