As we noticed in our last chapter, the only way to understand the apparent contradiction between the predictions about specific events that must occur before our Lord Jesus Christ returns to this earth, and the oft-repeated exhortation to Christian believers to be wide-awake and on the job because there is no way that they can tell when the Lord is coming, is to recognize that between His coming for His own followers and His coming to the earth to destroy all that is evil there must be an interval of several years.

A great many specific references to the Lord's return speak of His coming in power and great glory. If our inference as to the distinction between the two phases is correct, we should expect to have somewhere an explicit description of His earlier coming for the believers. Nor is this expectation disappointed. In his very first epistle the Apostle Paul gives a clear and unmistakable description of this important event.

Paul wrote this letter to the church that he had established at Thessalonica. Although it is quite brief, it contains allusions to so many important Christian doctrines that we can safely conclude that the Apostle had covered a wide range of Christian teaching during the comparatively brief time that he had spent at Thessalonica. His purpose in writing was to correct a misunderstanding about the Lord's return that was bothering the members of the young church that he had founded.

Let us look at I Thessalonians 4:13-18. It reads as follows:

13. But I would not have you to be ignorant, brethren, concerning them which are asleep, that ye sorrow not, even as others which have no hope. 14. For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with him. 15. For this we say unto you by the word of the Lord, that we which are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord shall not prevent them which are asleep. 16. For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the
