Edmund P. Clowney gives a carefully worked out presentation of the fact that God's temple on earth represents His presence among His people and that no temple built of stone can possibly replace such a presence. These are thoughts that all Christians need to ponder and to apply in their lives to make certain that they are actually parts of God's holy temple and are showing forth His praises as they should.

As is natural in a conference held in Jerusalem under present conditions, a considerable part of the program is devoted to the ideas of the speakers regarding Israel, its present situation and its future. Thus, among others, G. Douglas Young gives a fine plea for sympathy with the nation of Israel in its present problems.

The type of prophetic message that is more usual in prophetic conferences is represented in this book by Harold J. Ockenga on
