

a. perfections, he does change relations & comes to sustain relations which he did not sustain actually or necessarily. As it is in the creature of finite nationality, that the relation expressed by the name of God can't be. Our relation however, which necessarily arises from inherent and eternal perfections of God. It is God's Godhood; His special divinity which makes this union. To all reality that is not itself divine.

b. This must be distinguished from our inability to know created reality exhaustively. We cannot know any created entity exhaustively so even infinite reality is union. & finite &. limit, is an attribute of created things. We must not equate this union - in the nme. of God, when we apply it to God we have in view the complete disproportion between the infinitude of God & the finitude of human creaturely understanding. In the created realm we do not have the disproportion. All created reality is still finite. God is absolutely incomprehensible, whereas created reality is relatively nme. The reason why created things cannot be comprehensively known is that they are the creation of God. Only as related to God do they have being. Consequently our u. of created reality or any created entity is a u. of it as a creature of God & as dependent on him. So our u. of any created entity involves our u. of God. It leads back to this, since our u. of God is never exhaustive, our u. of any created entity is never comprehensive or exhaustive. The union of created reality arises, therefore, from the union of God himself. It is simply the relation of the union of God. Yet there is a distinction, because the union of God is primary & the reason for the union of created reality, whereas the union of created reality is secondary, & derived from union of God as creator & sustainer.

c. The nme. of God is absolute. It doesn't diminish with our increasing knw. of God is not more or less nme. as he is less or more known. The more we know God, the more intelligent becomes our apprehension of his nme. The more we extend the circumference
