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the rest of the dead lived not attain until the thousand years were finished. This is the first resurrection. Now, according to my understanding of that passage, the first resurrection must involve saints who have had experience with the antichrist, saints who have gone through his tribulation and have refused to accept his mark and have been murdered by him and--Dr. MacRae: The antichrist or the beast? Mr. Horner: the beast, and -- Dr. MacRae: Is that the same? Mr. Horner: Well, we can't go into all that matter but the mark of the beast is regarded in the 13th of Revelation as being the antichrist, clearly, and so those who are involved in the first resurrection have had experience with the antichrist and the only way to get around that is to have two first resurrections. This seems, as far as I know, the only way, and -- Dr. MacRae: Well, two first resurrections. As far as I am concerned the first resurrection, of course, could mean the resurrection of the just before the return of Christ. It could include the rapture and the addition of such individuals as were raised later. It doesn't say one way or the other. I don't think we can insist that one phrase must mean something at one instant. We have the great body of Christians raised. If this is before the tribulation, then there are others added to the number. There's no question about that, but that we can draw from one statement that it must be, that there cannot be further sections ^{if} to it. If the--a certain army goes over to Germany to fight, there could not be certain additional members sent to the army during the course of the next year and still would be part of the one event--the army going, it is rather . Mr. Heaney? When we look for the coming of Christ, are we to look for a series of events, are we to look for His glorious appearing, or are we to look for a secret rapture which we don't know when it will come, and if we are to look for that secret rapture, what evidence in Scripture do we have that there is going to be a secret rapture? Dr. MacRae: That's a big question . Well, now, let's look at Isaiah. We haven't so much time left but I want quickly to look at Isaiah here. Here is Isaiah 26, and you notice at the beginning of Isaiah 26 there is a song sung.
