without serious conviction, the high standard of the Hugenot morals was recognized even by their enemies. In an age of profligacy, the "Men of the Religion" as they called themselves, walked the paths of rectitude and sobriety". Well now from a man like this who is so hostile to everything Christian, that is quite a strong praise of the character which Calvinism produced in these French Hugenots. In France we have talked about Francis I a good bit and you are familiar with his character in general and his activities. He died in 1547, the same year in which Henry VIII died and he was succeeded by his son, Henry II, who reigned for the next 12 years. Henry II was much more strongly anti-Protestant than his father. He persecuted and slaughtered a great many but he was not very successful in wiping it out - it increased rather than decreased during his reign. We will not go into the details of his reign. He died in 1559 as a result of an accident in a tournament. And when he died, his son, who was a little boy fifteen, succeeded him. And this brought his wife into a position she had not been in before because Henry when he was 17 had fallen in love with a woman of 36 to whom his devotion never wavered until his death when she was 60. And so during the 12 years of his reign, his mistress, Diana de Boirtet, was the real power in France and his wife was pretty much in the background. Now his wife is a character of great importance in history . If we had lots of time we would spend two or three hours because she is very important historically . In view of our interest being really simply in the church, she's very important in connection with that too, but we have a lot of ground to cover, I'm only going to say a little about her. But you certainly should be familiar with her because she is a character who in discussions of history is quite much stressed. Now her name was Catharine and she was called Catharine de Medici and when you hear - yes? (Student question) That's his mistress - the king'smistress - you don't
