

of barriers. There was no regulation of the individual travelling from place to place. When I went to Germany in 1927 to 1929 I would make trips over into Czechoslovakia and I had to show my passport and I had to get a visa in order to get across the border. If I went over into Austria I had to get a different visa. There were all these different countries, and in ~~xxx~~ nearly every one of them you would have to spend almost a day in the consulate filling out papers in order to get a visa and to pay a fee, and at the border the train would have to ~~xx~~ stop for an hour or so while they examined all the passengers and saw that you had your visas, ~~xxxx~~ before anybody could pass ~~xxxxxxxxxxxx~~ from one country to another. And when I came back to the United States in 1929 it was a great relief because you could move about freely. You could go from Pennsylvania to New Jersey and not have to stop there and have a passport examined and go through all the rigamarole, but we still have to between the U. S. and Canada. But in this country we have 48 states in which you can go from one to the other with no regulation at the border asking why you are going into ~~xx~~ the next state and you have to explain everything about it. I found in 1947 when I went over to buy books in England I went to the British consulate here in town and asked for a visa so I could get into England to buy books, ~~xxxx~~ and the woman there at the ~~x~~ consulate said, why are you going to England and I said that I was going to buy books, and then you have to have a letter from the seminary stating that that is the reason for your going. Well, just ahead of me there was a man who was going over as a tourist, and he was going over to see England. And my wife ~~xx~~ said suppose I was representing myself, as this man ahead, I wouldn't need a letter from the seminary, would I, and she said oh no I wouldn't. But if you are representing the seminary you ~~xx~~ must have a letter. She said that if you were going representing yourself you wouldn't be allowed to buy any books. You have to have a letter, and there is all this rigamarole that you have to go through/ So I had to go away and come back another day, and I came back the next day with my letter, and I got in there, I got to the door at 20 seconds to 12:00, and I entered the door and she said, we are closing at
