 - e.g. Fundamentalist:- Statement of the 1923 Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.:- "It is an essential doctrine of the Word of God and our Standards that on the third day He rose again from the dead with the same body with which He suffered, with which also He ascended into heaven, and there sitteth at the right hand of His Father making intercession."

Modernist:- Merrill, William Pierson:- Liberal Christianity, pp. 57,58:-"The Liberal Christian is more or less indifferent to the question whether it was in the body or in the spirit that Jesus rose....The crucial fact, that which counts, is the indestructible persuasion that He lives, and is with us now, our Lord, our Master, through whom God draws near to us and we to Him."
