(stu) A person looking at it, in the immediate situation, his first thought is, what has ~~Christ~~ Christ got to do with it? Then when you look at the verses just before, you find that he is rebuking them, and he is addressing the whole house of David, and then you find Immanuel used in the next chapter, sometimes it gives good reason to say that it is, and then when in addition to that you find that it is very difficult to work it out chronologically, to have Hezekiah just born at this time, that doesn't seem to work, and it certainly doesn't seem to fit the prophet's son, in the next chapter, some try to make out it's Maher-shalal-hashbaz. How would that be a sign for anyone? And many try to make it ~~that~~. But those are the only two suggestions I know of, unless it's some unknown woman, what would be the prediction of an unknown woman? What would that be? So that its reference to the immediate situation must be very vital, and the reference to Christ is pretty difficult to escape.
