in chapter 41 developed more fully in 42, new iw- is now shown to have aspects that previously were not even imagined. And when 48:16 is interpreted in the light of 49:1-12 it becomes obvious that a new, tremendous truth comes into sight, something far beyond what anyone would have ever imagined / at an earlier stage of revelation.

A substantial portion of Part II is devoted to another problem that wax has risen as a result of Part II. There is little question any more of the greatness of God or of His power to save. The new question that arises is his desire to save. The Israel asks the question, Has God forsaken us? Has He thrown us over? After all, He has pointed out how deeply we have fallen into sin.

Does this mean that there is no hope for us? The greater part of chapters 50, and 51 handle this problem, and answer it under several divisions.

This is followed by a stirring declaration that God will never forget His people, but will be with them, and bless them to the very end. This leads the question still in their mind, How can this be since Israel is still in cincard is in the bondage to sin, and cannot escape from its consequences?

This, of course, is the vital problem of the whole section of our whole been toward which many different lines of thoughts have been leading. The answer term is the main consideration of Part III.
